This year has seen a real upturn in the club with all areas growing in enthusiasm and commitment. With now over 400 members Perranporth SLSC is now one of the largest in the country and we are making a difference to the safety of our beach.

This year the club have put in 843 voluntary patrolling hours which 474 hour was declared to the HM Coastguard. Perranporth have retaken up the commitment of patrolling under the new SLSGB framework where the club has to be audited each year to maintain. This was led by our Chairperson Doreen Lawrence and was made possible by our three Patrol Captain's Tom McRitchie, Esme Rogers and Toby Blanks who have given up more of their time for training to take on this role. We were able to achieve Level 3 patrols on most training evenings. This year we were able to put on an extra weeks patrol when the paid service finished covering the last week of the school half term



in October. If any member would like to get more involved or find out more about the Patrolling please let me know. The new frameworks will Team Type the patrol which is being declared at the time.

Along with the patrolling we have seen a large increase in club training both Lifesaving and Sport and a real buzz around the club. This year we have seen a real increase in competitor numbers at both SLS Cornwall and SLSGB events.

As with all clubs we go through changes and with that it's time to thank Cath our treasurer who has decided to stand down and to hand over the books. I can only thank her for all the help and support she has given both the club and myself over the years.

Perranporth SLSC is such an asset to our beach and the community of Perranporth so let's all keep working together and see the club grow.

We have so far enjoyed our anonymity having had a fairly low profile at the club despite Senioring the beach for several years now. However, even we have to admit - the Beach Lifeguard Award Training sessions have grown from a Wednesday night subsidiary group of enthusiastic youths and individuals to a full Monday night session. And we thank the club for dedicating a day for us in their ever busiing calendar. As most of you know this is Sam and I's first year doing it as fully qualified TAs. We look forward to continuing and improving these sessions next year- hopefully early spring.

Monday nights have become a permanent fixture of our week which we each look forward to (a lot) and plan (a little)- not only because we get to have a pint together afterwards without our other halves, but because of the enjoyment that we see each week as our students improve and encourage one another to excel and build a community of watermen and women with the rescue and first aid credentials to match.

We also give thanks to our ray of wednesday sunshine Doreen Lawrence. Despite destroying the delicate and hard earned patina on the inside of Sam's mug with her judicious application of cleaning products we have appreciated and enjoyed her company and voluntary assistance on Wednesday afternoons throughout the season. She has never failed to bring the sunshine with her and always manages to raise the morale and level of hygiene in the hut during her volunteer patrols.

I (Nunnors) was lucky enough to witness Freya Sanwell's rescue of a SUP boarder early in the year. One late afternoon in April whilst I was enjoying a few offshore, high tide waves on the Yellow (lifeguard talk for rescue board)I became aware of a



series of whoops passing down the line up behind me. Turning around and paddling back out I was met by a mexican wave of clubbie youths (Mia Barr, Seb Bartlett and Issac Sanwell) all using hand signals to alert myself and my colleagues to a SUP boarder who had been pulled out through the notorious blind-spot in the 'gap' and was currently clinging to her board and shouting for help about 200m from shore in strong offshore winds. Upon my arrival Freya had reassured the lady and established a tow with her raceboard and begun to make good headway back to shore. An event that has happened outside of lifeguarded hours I am certain would have had a very different result had Freya not been on hand.



Other points of mention go out to Sam Hillary and Ben Evans aka 'Shillary' and 'Bevans', for their professionalism when operating VHF radios and being put in charge of the operations room during a busy period- a big ask but nothing those boys couldn't handle! All the guys put in a lot of volunteer hours this year but we commend 'Shillary' for clocking up over 100 hours!! Well done!

Aaron, good work for taking on 4ft low tide on a board 3x your size, don't bail grab rail, also thanks for keeping the lifeguards in shape by eating all of our biscuits! The most important point is, even if you only managed 1 hour over the whole season, you gave your time to help your community and the lifeguards, we always appreciate it! Good stuff team!

It's been a great pleasure to see a number of students put their skills into practice on the beach as RNLI volunteers this season. We hope they have found this valuable and enjoyable- and we wish them the best of luck in their applications early next year should they choose to apply for a paid role- which they should! 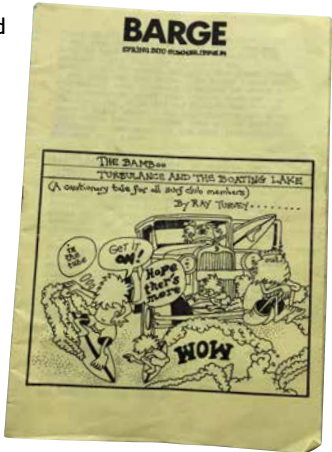

I'm sat writing this years report on the beach in half term, there are still about 70 people in the water and three hundred walkers, quite a few asking where yesterdays 7.72m Minke whale carcass is, but thankfully that was removed overnight.

End of the season is always a time of reflection and I just finished reading a copy of the clubs old newsletter 'The Barge Spring into Summer 1984'. All this gets me thinking why I'm still here after 24 years of professional lifeguarding, quite simply the work that the Club and the Lifeguards do is astounding and as seasons get longer and the work gets more varied we are very lucky to have the club and the professional service. It is my belief that the two at Perranporth are too linked to distinguish and hugely benefit each other. How do we hang onto lifeguards that are Biologists, Architects, Nurses, Paramedics, Firemen, world travellers and have all manner of skills?



Lifeguarding gets a hold of you, it starts with the club, then the volunteering, then the wages, but that doesn't hold people? It is the camaraderie, the varied 'jobs' that come our way as the uniform presence on the beach.

Much of what was in 'The Barge' would probably miss the mark for many nowadays, but the ethos and the names are all too familiar. Celebrating qualifications gained, the humour, the determination, the belief in lifeguarding and the bonds that are made that are essential when in sometimes testing seas and situations and you know someone has your back and you theirs. Instead of Tony Gardiner, Simon Lawrence, Simon Martyn, Pete Gaisford etc it is Ben Gardiner, Max Lawrence, Harvey Gaisford, Aaron Martyn etc, this stuff gets in the blood and carries on.

I alluded to varied jobs and have a summary of a few bits below with some photos. My most memorable this season is probably the inflatable unicorn that we commandeered at Perran Sands after a young lad got stuck climbing the cliff and St Agnes cliff rescue team came to help.

We also had the arson fire on the cliffs at Easter, arranged litter picks and ‘rescued a buoy’ from between the red and yellows.



What continues to make the guards and the club better is the skill sets we have and must share. We have beach topography experts, national event organisers, international level judges, a growing number of trainers and assessors, cake makers, Coastguards, organisers, strategists, willing people giving up their time and everyone contributing to making Perranporth



stay firmly on the map as a community and a beach to be part of and visit.

Rob Nunn and Sam Chamberlain both professional lifeguards are delivering Beach Lifeguard courses giving a development for the youth to get into volunteering and potentially professional lifeguarding, the clubbie petrol heads IRB training giving them a valuable edge over other first time applicants (Jack and Harvey have a good tale about doing their IRB crew assessments with me in six foot low tide seas and the new ‘double person punch’ manoeuvre!).

Anyone interested in working or volunteering for the RNLI in 2020 can get an application submitted in the New Year. Follow the advertisement for applications (volunteer and paid) on the RNLI website or speak to Ben. Fitness requirements are a Beach Lifeguard qualification, 400m swim in under seven and a half minutes, a 200m run in under 40 seconds and an underwater pool swim. Full details are on the website <https://summerjobs.rnli.org/lifeguards> and be part of the wider team.

Perran Sands and Perranporth Team 2019



Perranporth is one of the seven beaches running from Portreath to Holywell managed by the RNLI’s Perranporth Support Centre. A lot of our inductions and training for this area are conducted in and around Perranporth due to accessibility, permissions and the size and quality of the beach.

As an RNLI volunteer or seasonal lifeguard you get RNLI training and training with other agencies. So varied we even get input from wildlife experts, Lifeboat visits, Air Ambulance visits and Police talks, Coastguard visits to name a few. This prepares for many real responses like fires, anti-social behaviour, local byelaw advisories, beached whales, missing person searches and so on. Club youth members posed for a press release after coming forward to assist lifeguards at Easter when they were rescuing persons from the water, thank you and don’t hesitate to offer support if you feel capable.

I would encourage all members to jointly share information on the ‘Community Lifesaving Perranporth’ Facebook Page.



This unified approach is reflected in the fantastic safety cover for this years Triathlon and the Castle 2 Castle swim again, we hope to keep the professional lifeguards and the club cross training and assessing, providing youngsters and not-so-youngsters with new opportunities, helping each other when the proverbial could hit the fan.

Many Thanks from the RNLI team to Perranporth for training the future lifesavers and conducting rescues and providing cover out of the lifeguard hours. The club with the support from SLSGB and the RNLI now share the ‘Ops and Obs room’ with a Memorandum of understanding as well as the Medical Room (Thank you Mick Sanwell for getting that much more organised).



NIPPER MANAGER

2019 has been a fantastic year both for the Club and Perranporth Nippers. Hosting the Cornish Nipper Champs this year gave our surf hungry children the opportunity to show the other Cornish Clubs why we are made of strong and determined stuff! This year we have enrolled all 2019 Nippers onto the new SLS GB Nipper Lifesaver Pathway Award system, a simple lifesaving knowledge and skills programme based on age group club activity. The Bronze, Silver and Gold pathways allow a child to gain confidence and recognition for their achievements. Most important of all, it is the first step to becoming a competent Lifesaver. Ongoing assessment took place this summer and all our Nippers achieved their relevant age sport competency Ocean Star pin which was presented at the September BBQ. This is required for competing in Nipper sport events from 2019.

There has been a bigger uptake of children entering both the Nipper Regional and National Nipper events this year, although we could do with more entries for the two National Championships out of county so that we can enter all the team events fully. We know that time and cost are a big factor in this for many families but our Nippers and Parents who do make the effort look on these events as a big family trip and have a fabulous memory making time away when they go.

Our Nippers have really stepped up in the results tables this year. Under the guidance of Team Manager Jayne Chapman and with the help of Annie Lee and Andy Davies, forty-eight children attended the two Cornish Region Frostbite Pool events at Penzance in February whilst twenty Nippers made the journey to Cardiff International Pool for the SLS GB National Pool Championships in March. Unusually there was a low turnout of twenty-six Nippers for the free local Max Hocking Nipper Fun Day at Hayle. Guess the calendar is sometimes just too full. Our Nippers performed magnificently at the Cornwall Nipper Championships held on our own beach, we were unbelievably 4th Club overall and gained tons of medals and finalists. Performing on our own beach was inspirational for the team, gutted that we didn't get to do more in the water, we would have placed higher for sure if we had. A great club atmosphere was felt over the weekend.

A team of twenty-five committed children and parents took the opportunity to go to the SLS GB National Ocean Championships at a flat Branksome Chine, Dorset. They had a marvellous time away at this great venue giving their absolute best, having fun together and helping place the Club a remarkable 5th out of 30 clubs with fabulous individual and relay/team wins. Well done

Team Perranporth Nippers! [See the Results/Competition section of this report for Nippers who medalled/placed in event finals] Our Aquathon had lower entries this year, probably due to it falling during school holidays but fifty-seven Perran Nippers entered, and we had a brilliant afternoon despite a testing sea.

What a great final beach session this year! Sunset, BBQ, photos and surf in good company closed the summer nicely and we are now at Waterworld every Thursday for swim training.

Our next event is the 2019 Nipper Award Night in December and you can see the winners of 2018 Age Group Trophies and Stars listed here. All children have potential. Some will be naturally fast and co-ordinated, some it takes time, patience and determination to get there. The awards are voted on by the Coaches, Age Managers and D of E Youth helpers. There are many reasons our children shine, and we need to make them feel valued when they do.

Our aim is to support all Nippers equally and give them all the same opportunities to develop into great young people. An important point to remember is that they are children and what we do should be enabling, inclusive and good fun. Some of our most loyal and committed members have been those that have really had to work hard coming through the club from Nippers learning their skills but whose perseverance has paid off in the



end. We will support and include ever Nipper at every level whatever they chose to aim for, sport, lifesaving or both, a cohesive club is a happy and successful club.

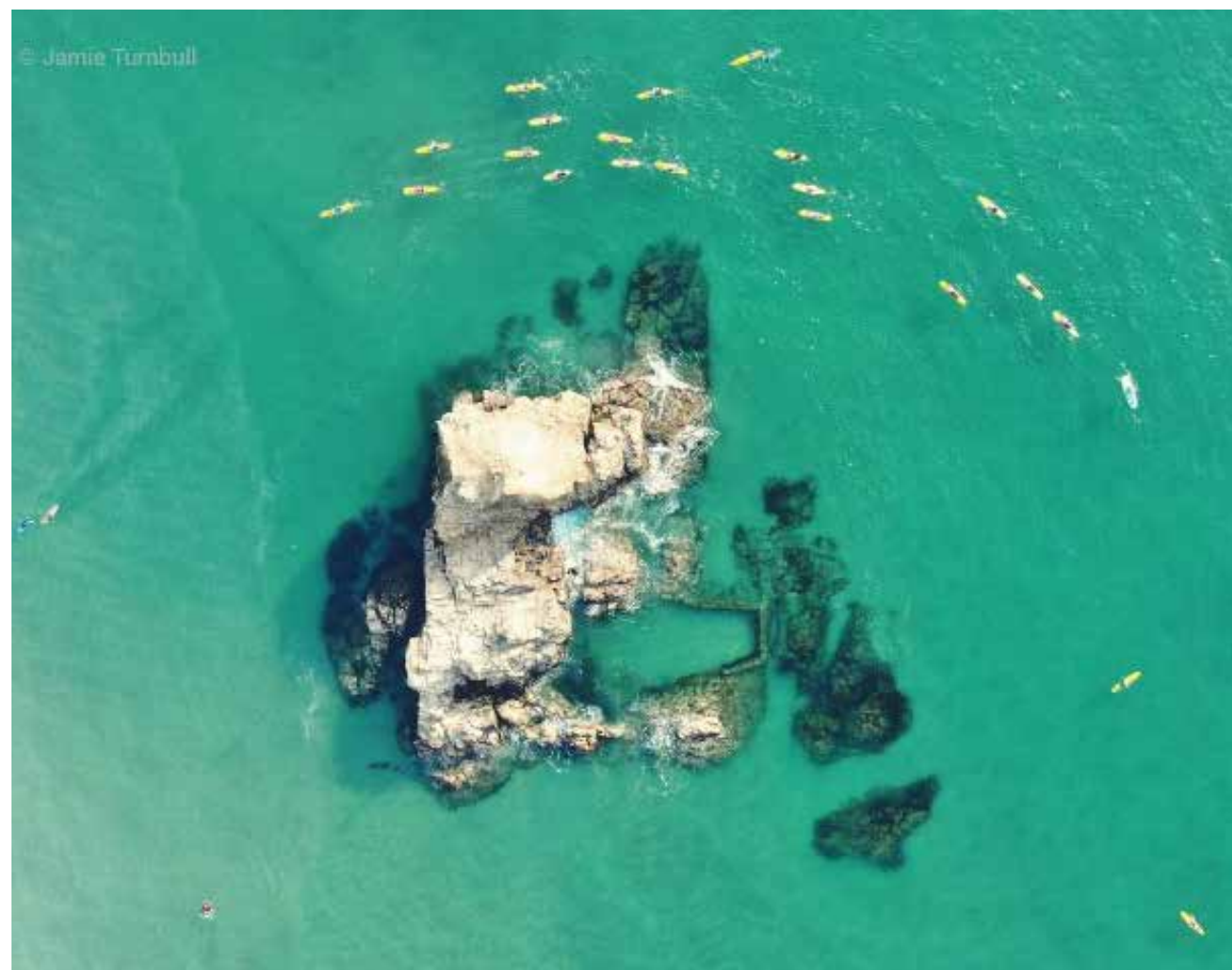

2019 has been a busy year for the IRBs and crews. March saw the delivery of the new rescue boat launch vehicle. Thanks especially must go to Nigel Bowden for chasing and then securing the funding for this essential bit of kit. The crews were keen to put it through its paces, and it has certainly proved invaluable over the year for IRB launch and recovery. A well deserved winter service and some weatherproofing will see it serving the club well for years to come.

March saw club IRB crews continuing with their involvement with the SLS Cornwall flood response at the 24 hour overnight deployment exercise, Operation Nemo2.

Training got underway early this year, with there being a lot of interest shown from all quarters of the club. We continue to introduce, train and turn out crews and drivers from all age groups who are comfortable and skilled enough to operate in 5 foot low tide Perran. A skill set that only comes from training in that environment, and is a real help to those going on to work on the beach for the RNLI as lifeguards.

We continued to support the RNLI's Castle to Castle swim in June, with the reciprocal support by the RNLI of our September Triathlon. Both events continue to have very high level water cover, and give a great opportunity and environment to bring new crews on, and give them operational experience.

June saw the inaugural Duncan Newby swim at Perranporth, which saw teams of 5 swim the beach as a team. The IRB's and the regions RWC were all used by the club to ensure top quality water cover. All done from within the skill set of the club. Thanks to Simon Jeffery for his original concept and organisation for this event – top job.

A different request came to the IRB's in July, in the form of a request to supply water cover for the Watering Holes sister event in South Devon, Tunes in the Sands. A team of 7 IRB crew dispatched from Cornwall for the 3 day event at Blackpool Sands, where night operations were required to ensure everyone was safe on the 60+ boats that were anchored up and partying just off the beach.

The IRB made an appearance in the towns carnival this summer, and saw it towing waterskiing Doreens through the main street.



I don't think many visitors knew what was going on, but every local was in stitches, when they saw and heard Doreen in her many guises.

The Nipper champs made a return to Perran this summer, and sure enough, it was low tide, with surf, and quite a dredging bank to deal with. It made for pretty testing conditions in the IRB's, so hats off to all the legend nippers who competed that day.

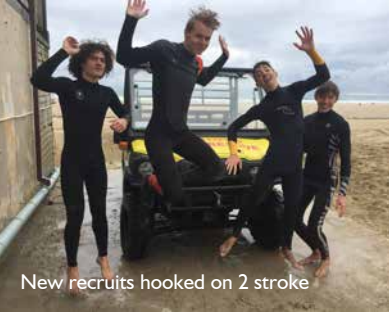
